SOCIETY NEWS

As all members who attended the inaugural meeting on the 2nd April 1976 will know, The Mid-Derbyshire Family History Society owes much to Mr. Frank Payton of the Genealogical Society of the East Midlands. A good deal of interest in Genealogy was developed locally through the 1975/6 series of lectures on the subject, given by Mr. Payton under the auspices of the Werkers Education Authority. The formation of our Society was a natural extension of this interest Again, Mr. Payton helped tremendously in the initial stages of getting the Society off the ground

The lectures were held at the Cressy Fields Centre in Alfreton, which has ideal facilities for any members who happen to be physically handicapped. Mr. Grant, the manager of the Centre , has kindly agreed to the continued use of the premises by the Society for

its Discussion and Lecture Meetings

Cressy Fields is situated on the corner, at the junction of Cressy Road and Hall

Street, very near to the new bus station in Alfreton.

On the 30th April 1976 the first Discussion Meeting of the Society was held at Cressy Fields. There was a rich display of genealogical material, which created equally rich opportunities for discussion between members. Refreshments were laid on and a raffle held - and it was altogether a very friendly and informal gathering. The exchange of

information was prolific, and it was generally thought to be a successful way of getting to know fellow members and sharing experiences. A similar meeting was planned for the

23rd July.

Our first outside project, transcribing memorial inscriptions in Pentrich churchyard on 29th May, is described by Mr. P.J. Middlehurst elsewhere in this issue. A visit to the County records office at Matlock was well attended on the 25th June, when members heard an interesting description of some of the contents of the archives given by Andrew Jones, B.A. Examples of Parish Registers, Rate Books, Poor Law Settlements, and numerous ether documents were put on display. The C.R.O. is still relatively young, but it had already gathered large quantities of material, and it was clear that they have a heavy werkload, with a good deal of indexing etc. remaining to be tackled. A second visit is planned for those members who could not attend on this first eccasion.

Problems and Fascinations Over Family.

My aim is to try to prove or dispreve the family legend that Nicolas-Jean Soult, one of Napoleon's Marshals, is an ancestor of the Soults of Ripley, Derbyshire. My father's mother was a Ripley Soult. Marshal Soult was born on 29 March 1769 at Saint-Amans-la-Bastide, now St-Amans Soult, near Castres, and died there on 26 Novr. 1851

Owing to the disappearance of the Soult family Bible, I had to start my search by sending for my Grandmother's birth certificate; her name was Mary and she was born around 1876 in the Ripley area, this I already knew. Relatives told me her parents were John and Ann. I needed the certificate to prove this in order to obtain their marriage certificate A full birth certificate usually gives the place of birth, both parents names including

the mothers maiden name and the occupation of the father.

A certificate can be obtained from St. Catherine's House, London, provided you can give the approximate date the event took place and one of the parents names in the case of a birth certificate. In the case of a marriage certificate, it is advisable to be able to give the fathers name, as the mothers name is not entered on the certificate. A certificate now costs £4-50 including search fee. If you visit St. Catherine's House and make the search yourself, a certificate will only cost £2-50. Only the indexes are available for inspection and are set out in alphabetical order of the surnames and forenames of the person to whom the event relates, in separate books for births, marriages and deaths, also giving the registration district in which the event was registered and a reference number. These are compiled for each quarter of each year for the whole of England and Wales. Civil registration of births, marriages and deaths began on 1 July 1837. If you are sure of the registration district in which the event took place, you can obtain your certificate from the registration office of that district for £2.50, no search fee is charged.

When my Grandmother's birth certificate arrived, it stated that she was born in March 1876 at Green Hillocks, Riplay and her parents were John and Ann (formerly White) My next step was to send for the marriage certificate of John and Ann to obtain his

father's name. I understood from relatives that my grandmother was the third child of the family so I guessed the marriage would have taken place pre 1874, probably in the Belper registration district. I asked for a search to be made in the years 1869/1873 (the search fee covers a period of five years) They could not find the entry. I wrote again asking for a search to be made from 1864/1868 inclusive, but again they could not find the entry. Very puzzled, I decided to go to London to make the search myself. I found the marriage entry for a John Soult in the September quarter of 1864, registered in the Derby district. If the partners name is known, it is advisable to cross check elsewhere in the register for that name, if it is found and the registration district and the index number are the same, you are sure you have your couple. I found Amn White, but here was the problem, although she had the same index number, she was registered under Belper. Register Office Assistants said this could not be my couple as the registration districts were different. I even saw the Manager, who wouldn't commit himself but promised to look into the matter. I again received a note stating the entry could not be found. I immediately sent asking that the marriage certificate of John Soult , which I had noted in the indexes be sent to me. It arrived and duly stated that John Soult married Ann White in September 1864 in the Belper district. All those years ago someone made a mistake by stating that John Soult was married in the Derby District. Now the searchers in the office would probably not realise that Belper is in the County of Derby and would not relate the two. Lesson number one - visit the records fooice yourself if possible. I must add that I was charged the old price for the certificate as I had originally applied before the price rise on 1 October 1975.

From this certificate I learned my great grandfathers date of birth plus his fathers name, which was also John, so his birth certificate was easily located, registered in the Ripley area of the Belper district in 1846, stating that his

mothers name was Mary (Formerly Green)

My next step was to find the marriage certificate of John Soult and Mary Green, A personal search of the indexes from 1837/1846 proved fruitless. Did the marriage take place before July 1837? I then learned that the census returns for 1851,1861 and 1871 are on microfilm at Derby Central Library. These are of value as they not only give the family names, but also their approximate age, occupation and place of birth. It is advisable to make an appointment to view these. In the 1851 census I found John and Mary Soult and family. John snr. was 50 and born at Stavely, but in the 1861 census he was married to Eliza and there were two more children. Had Mary died and had he married again between 1851 and 1861? Here was a chance to obtain his second marriage certificate, and this was easily found at the Belper registration office. This marriage took place in 1857 and stated that his fathers name was Samuel which doesn't sound very French to me. John Soult snr. was bern in 1811 according to his age in the census returns, so he could have been Marshal Sault's son or grandson. I have searched the Staveley census returns and Anglican registers without finding trace of any Soult, perhaps they will be found in the nonconformist registers. The big question is, was Samuel Soult a son of Marshal Soult?

Menaced Churchyards Laid Laid at the Market Market

In connection with our self-imposed task of recording and indexing memorial inscriptions in Derbyshire Churchyards, we have made enquiries of the County Surveyor to find out which churchyards may be affected by highway improvements so depriving genealogists of valuable information in the future. Apparently headstones have already been lifted and stacked at some churches including Littlemoor Congregational Church, Gladstone Road, Glossop. These stones may still be available for transcribing inscriptions and as it only affects a small number of stones, perhaps someone who is passing that way would like to do a good deed? The work is expected to begin in the near future.

St. Mathew's Church, Hayfield also has the headstones stacked in anticipation of building a Church Hall on the site in late 1976/early 1977.

A small number of headstones at Christchurch, Dalbury Lees is affected by a road improvement scheme planned for 1976/77 and at Christchurch in Chesterfield some stones are likely to be affected on the east side by the Inner Relief Road scheme programmed to start in 1979.

If any members know of any other development schemes likely to throaten old churchyards, will they please inform the committee so that steps can be taken to collect the relevant data before it is lost

MEMORIAL INSCRIPTIONS - PENTRICH CHURCHYARD

Add to reduce recommended Contributed by P.J. Middlehurst

On Saturday 29th May, ten members of the society met at Pentrich to record memorial inscriptions. Unfortunately after weeks of fine weather, the British summer arrived and

rain fell all morning.

Mr. Davis and Mrs. Stumbles decided that conditions were too bad and beat a hasty retreat, but the remainder of the party, Mrs. Johnson, Mr. Knight, Mr. & Mrs. Middlehurst, Mr. Spencer and son, Mrs. Staley and Mrs. Waterall, took advantage of a break in the clouds and set forth to see what could be done. What faced us was wet knee high grass, gravestones overgrown with ivy, and gravestones sunk into the ground. It was agreed that it was impossible to attempt anything that day, but a sketch map was drawn and the Churchyard split into sections defined by natural boundaries so that members could return

in small parties as they found time.

On subsequent visits, 180 inscriptions have been recorded from 91 stenes and some of these are recorded below. If you can help with completing the task, get in touch with any member of the committee. They will be only too pleased to receive any assistance Footnote I am trying to obtain a copy of the memorial inscriptions from Swanwick Churchyard. The Vicar wishes to remove all the stones and grass over the graves. However, he did not wish to do this without recording the inscriptions, and so last summer a party of police cadets from Butterley Hall, under the leadership of P.C. Robinson, recorded them for him as part of their Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme gold medal project.

They drew a plan of the churchyard marking the position of each stone and copied all the information inscribed. I have contacted P.C. Robinson and he has promised to

obtain a copy for our library.
