MEETINGS REPORT

Approximately 50 members were at Cressy Fields to hear Mr. Gladwyn Turbutt talk on the history of Ogston and Higham. We learnt of the Revills of Ogston and the De Greys of Shirland and Higham. It was interesting to hear that a fair which was in a charter of 1243 still takes place in Shirland and Higham every year. Mr. Turbutt illustrated his talk with photographs, we saw the old 'Black Bull' which is now Bull Farm, a picture of the old cattle fair, also photographs of old and new schools showing the contrast in buildings, the older schools having far more character.

Between 1829 and 1891 the population doubled due to the sinking of Shirland Pit, the census returns will no doubt have a lot of strays during this period.

Mr. Turbutt ended his talk by showing us the changing face of a house, Ogston, photographs illustrated how the house, which came into his family, was altered both inside and out through the centuries.

The meeting of June 26th was once again well attended with members making good use of the many reference sections we now have available.

A check of the DRONFIELD Parish Begisters reveals: "A Terrior of all the Housing & Glebe Land belonging to the Parish of Dronfield. (item no. 4) ...north to a close now in the posession of a Godfrey SYKES..."

1697 & 1705. "...now in the posession of Margaret SYKES widd. ..." 1714. His children were: Thomas (b. 1.9.1678); Mary (b. 5.4.1682 m. Daniel STEVENSON 23.10.1717); Francis (b. 17.2.1683); Margery (b. 23.4.1865, d. 13.8.1723); "Godfrey (b. 13.12.1686, m. Eleanor ASHFIELD 9.5.1723); (*) Robert (b. 17.4.1689, m. Mary FOX 30.4.1727); Esther (b. 28.12.1692, m. Thomas HATTERSBY 3. 4. 1708; Alice (b. 18.2.1694) and George (b. 30.5.1697) all born in **CODHOUSE.** (Godfrey d. 24.12.1755).

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A further check of the DRONFIELD Parish Registers reveals: "A Terrior of ...HOLMESFIELD ...the other house now in the posession of Thomas Hattersby and Robert Sykes..." 1714.

Whilst searching for my family history I have discovered that I am connected with the family of Samuel SLATER, born 9th June 1768 at BELPER, Derbys.

Samuel is better known as (The father of American manufacture,) he was apprenticed to Jedediah Strutt, the manufacturer of cotton spinning machinery, when he had served his time he went to the U.S.A. where he built from memory, cotton spinning machinery, thereby starting the industry at PAWTUCKET, Rhode Island. The town of SLATERSVILLE, R.I. was named after him. His sister Elizabeth, born in 1764 was one of my ancestors. They were two of eleven children of William & Elizabeth (formerly FOX), William a farmer, timber merchant, and land agent. The family home was HOLLYHOUSE, Blackbrook, Belper, Derbys. William died in 1782 at the age of 54 after injuries caused by a fall whilst loading bales of hay on a cart. His widow Elizabeth re-married twice.

I have reason to believe these SLATERS to be connected with SLATERS of CHESTERFIELD, whose family home was DURANT HALL, CHESTERFIELD, as the coat of arms of this family is displayed alongside Samuel SLATER'S portrait.

Young Elizabeth was married by license to John TOPLISS a farmer of WOODHALL, Lincs, at DUFFIELD, Derbys. Was John TOPLISS also of Derbyshire? His date of birth would be circa 1755. His father John was a farmer at CAR COLSTON, Notts. prior to moving to WOODHALL, Lincs. There is no record of young John's birth at either of the above mentioned places.

THROUGH THE LETTER BOX.

Mrs. C. Thomson, memb. no. 257, tells us of notes made by her father after conversations with his mother. From these notes unfolds a charming little story, showing what we can learn by listening to the tales which the old people can relate. Read on.

"Father, William MURFIN was born at BIGGIN (son of William and Mary MURFIN). Mary's maiden name was WARD. She was the daughter of Annie WARD. Father's grandfather, John MURFIN, was a farm labourer of BIGGIN. Father went plough driving and thrashing before 10 years of age, in petticoats (smocks). He used to thrash corn with flail or thrail. He went to service at 12 years of age and milked 5 cows. I know the house where he lived. He then went to live at TURNDITCH for 7 or 8 months and then went to WHITTAKERS and hired boys for the summer. Then he went to live at SHOTTLE and was there when the Queen was crowned in 1838. He stayed a year and then went to BUTLER'S, BIGGIN HILL, then to KIRK IRETON for 2 years and then came to WOOLLEY'S and stayed 4 years."

"Mother, Mary BARDILL was born at DENBY in 1825, December 11th. She was 13 years old the year that the Queen was crowned. Her mother was Hannah SMITH of BELPER, daughter of Joseph and Ellen SMITH. Joseph was a nail maker. Mary BARDILL (Father's mother) went into "service" at 10 years of age. She went to an "old woman's school" until that age. She was 1 year at WEST HALLAM, 2 years at CODNOR with Chris. MARTIN, Baptist Minister and Shoemaker. She used to write his texts down and also repeat his sermons to his wife, having a very good memory then. She left Mr. MARTIN and went home because her father was in a consumption, and she used to read to him. Her father was a Wesleyan, Thomas BARDILL, a shoemaker, a trade which was bad for his health. He was buried at Denby church in 1838. Then mother went to PARKER'S the grocers from Feb. until Nov. 23rd. At the age of 15 she went to Mrs. ABELL, a good woman, and wife of Rev. MIDDLETON the vicar of DENBY? After 2 years she went to live with Mrs. WOOLLEY nee BARDILL at The Coppice. She was cousin to Rev. J. WOOLLEY and Geo. WOOLLEY.

Father went to live at WOOLLEY'S on the Tuesday and mother came on the Thursday, Nov. 23rd. She lived there nearly 7 years. Father was there 4 years and then left and went to Mrs. SHAW. (He must have returned)—"Mary, I've hired Bill again" and the old lady cried—"O dear! He's courting that wench." He said, "I don't care, he's the best lad I have had". They were married at RIPLEY Parish Church on Tuesday 11th April, 1848, by the Rev. John WOOD of SWANWICK. He had 3 livings; Vicar of Ripley and Pentrich and a living in Staffs. Ann, father's eldest sister went to church with them.

(The above is an actual reproduction of the jottings sent by Mrs. C. Thomson, showing how a story can be formed if short notes are made.)

Mr. W.M. Harris, memb. no. 403 sent in this interesting information before he became a member of the Society and was immediately invited to join us!
"With reference to D.F.H.S. "Branch Nesw" No. 15, page 9 "Notes made in the Heanor Registers by Thomas Gillott, Clerk to the Parish." I hope the following information may be of use to you or to your members.

RD.

Where the year of a particular event is not known, it is possible to give probable years for that event if the day of the week, the date and the month the event took place are known. Further information may narrow it down to only one possible year as in the case of Robert Gelott.

Assuming Robert Gelott, born Monday 19th September 17-- to be the sedond child, he must have been born between 1714 and 1717. The only possible year on which the 19th September fell on a Monday was 1715.

The time of birth for Tho. Gillott is given as 3 o'clock Saturday night i.e. Sunday. Assuming this means August, the 2nd was a Sunday, there are a number of possible years for the birth when August the 2nd fell on a Sunday, that is 1719, 1724, 1730 or 1741, the latter date being unlikely if the parents were married in 1712."

Mr. James Wragg, memb. no. 245, sends in the following information after reading "Heads of Families in the Ambergate and Toadmoor area from the 1851 census of Heage" in "Branch News" No. 17. page 15.

"The Isaac Wragg mentioned by G. Whittingham was the father of another Isaac Wragg, a baker who kept a shop at Allenton, Derby, from at least 1904 to 1920. In the later part of this period he went into partnership with his son-in-law and also kept a shop at

4 Tenant Street, under the style "Wragg & Hamblin".

Typically Victorian, Isaac (the baker) had six brothers and no doubt there are descendants of the family still living in the area today.

THE DERBYSHIRE MARRIAGE INDEX 1538-1837 (An Explanation)

This index, which is and for many years will be in the process of compilation, is open to postal searches provided a stamped addressed envelope is enclosed. There is no fee for this although donations are appreciated.

To make things a little clearer for intending enquirers it needs to be understood how the index is arranged in order to obtain best use of it.

The index is arranged by SURNAME and then chronologically, only the grooms name is indexed and searches cannot be undertaken for brides unless the married surname is known. The 200 odd parishes are not indexed seperately as a large number of marriages often took place in the bride's parish. Ideally therefore, the index can be best used to try to locate a 'missing marriage' and the husband's name together with that of his wife, if known, should be supplied, together with the years for which a search should be made.

Until recently I have given lists of marriages of one surname to those that have requested it, but owing to the rapid growth of the index and consequentially entries of names together with other important demands on my time, this will have to be paid for in future. Those who insist on having all entries, should write for an estimate first.

When completed, the index will be typed up and deposited in the County Record Office at Matlock. It is being compiled privately and is independent of the Derbyshire F.H.S.

An up to date list of parishes, dates and sources included in the index will be sent to enquirers. The SOURCES are important, as entries in the index SHOULD ALWAYS BE CHECKED against the original and that this is only an index and should be used as such must be understood.

Further information on Marriage Indexes can be found in "Marriage Indexes, how to find, use and compile them". 2nd edition 1980, by Michael Walcot and Jeremy Gibson, published by the Federation of Family History Societies. This should help to clarify any difficulties as well as give an insight into the problems involved.

ALL PRIZES IN GOLD AT BRAILSFORD RACES. Printed with permission from the author John Williamson, and the Derby Evening Telegraph. During the autumn of 1825 a small handbill appeared in Derby, and the surrounding villages containing news of a local sporting attraction. It was entitled Brailsford Races, and announced that "a race-meeting and sweepstake followed by a shooting match and cockfight" would be held on the first Wednesday in November. And that all payments and prizes would be transacted in golden sovereigns. There were many folk at that time to whom a sovereigne was a fortune, for England was in the grip of a great money panic. Banks had made rash loans to half the countries of the world, and people of all classes had indulged in the most reckless speculations. Money, in fact, was scarce! For the moment, however, the hardy farming community of Derbyshire were unruffled by news of the financial straits of others. Indeed, the high price of corn had put cash in their pockets, and a day's sport - with all the usual eating and drinking - was their idea of a "right good spree." It was against this background of rural prosperity that the holiday of the year) were in festive mood. The village population was then about 780 but

Brailsford November race-meeting was hold, and the wakes week crowd (enjoying the one general with Derby Races in low water, it was natural that the racing riff raff should have come from far and wide. The place of meeting was a large field in Luke Lane, just beyond The Plain, where the road turns right for Mercaston, and is still appropriately known as Race Course Close.

Headquarters were established at the almost-forgotten Black Bull Inn (near the entrance to the field) from which Joshua Barnes Esquire, clerk of the course, issued the following instructions: "A sweepstake of one sovereign each with 5 sovereigns added will be given for horses of all ages - not thoroughbreds. Three-year-olds to carry 8 stones. Four-year-olds 3 stones 10 pounds. Five-year-olds 9 stones 6 pounds. Aged horses 10 stones. mames to be entered before 10 o'clock, and start precisely at 1 o'clock. All dogs found on the course will be shot."

Stewards for the event were Lord Derby and Sir Robert Rufus, Bart. There is a touch of rustic humour in the horses' names and it is easy to believe that some, at least, were specially concocted for the occasion. We now come to the first race, a two-mile handicap in which there were ten starters:

"Ar. Haynes' Careful, by Doubtful.

Mr. Smith's Snuffle-eye, by Sugar-tub.

Mr. Houghton's Jack, by Random.

Mr. Barne's Turn-unto-her by Seymour.

Mr. Morley's Not Gravel by Blunderbus.

Mr. Sanders' Spectacle, by Optician.

Mr. Ride's Small Hope, by Little Joey.

Mr. Webster's The Lad for Lasses.

Mr. Hancock's Whistler, by Whiteheather,

Mr. Dowdeswell's Fetch-em-up, by Wagistrate."

The second race was for ponies not exceeding 13 hands, and the prize, a purse of gold, again attracted ten runners. Many local names are prominent on the race card. The Websters have farmed at Brailsford and Mercaston for generations; the Morley's, too, were farmers and tutchers at Ednaston and Kirk Langley; Isaac Smith and Joe Barnes came from Mugginton; the Rides were smiths and wheelwrights, and John Dowdeswell kept the old Saracen's Head. We do not know which, if any, of these characters were flushed with success as a result of the sweepstake, but there was still time for winner to lose all. To quote again from the printed programme: "A shooting match of five birds each will commence after the races." The targets were flighted pigeons, difficult birds to hit as they rocketed skywards. One of the best shots in the county was Mr. Calvert (agent to three Lords Vernon) and his marksmanship would have tempted the gamblers. As the November afternoon deepened, winners and contestants, together with the more important guests, retired into the warmth of the Black Bull Inn. And at 6 o'clock, Samuel Orme, the genial landlord served a splendid dinner, with much brandydrinking, toasting and merriment.

The remainder of the Brailsford race crowd were accommodated at the Rose and Crown and the Saracen's Head, where a "market ordinary" (meaning the usual roast beef, vegetables, pudding and cheese - with strong ale, of course) was put on at a shilling a head. For those who desired no more than liquid refreshment, ample stocks were on tap at the two beer-houses owned by John and William Bainbridge. Brailsford could also boast its own two maltsters, and William Crawford, the baker, supplied everybody with his celebrated Wakes Cakes.

The feasting over, a roisterous group of men gathered round the cock-pit, which was situated in the centre of the village, immediately opposite the old Saracen's Head. An official notice informed all that "in the evening a Main of Cocks will be Fought from the hours of 8 o'clock to 10 o'clock." And we can picture the excitement prevailing when the

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visiting gentry began to wager big sums. As we say in Derbyshire, there was "a ruck o' money about!"

Although it was unlikely that the Brailsford race crowd of November 1825, would rise to such wild prodigality, gold coin had changed hands freely during the day's events. At 10 o'clock there was a return to the inns for a final round of drinks and a settlement of outstanding debts.

COVER PICTURE: Tissington situated in the lowsiest part of Dovedale, lies 3½ miles to the north of Ashbourne and is approached from one direction by a half mile avenue of lime trees and from another through a Ford. The Hall, the seat for many generations, of the family of FitzHerbert is a fine old mansion, chiefly of late Elizabethan date. The church of St. Mary is of early Norman date, restored in the 19th century, but there are still many Norman features, including the tower which is of massive construction. The church contains many memorials to the FitzHerbert family. The church registers dating from 1658 are at the C.R.O.

Tissington is very proud of its long tradition of Well Dressing, an interesting custom which takes place each year. The five fresh spring wells which are situated in the village are blessed during a special service held on Ascension Day, a thanks-giving for the pure and ever flowing water supply. The Well Dressings consist of the erection of boards in the form of arches, with a panel behind, perhaps 7 or 8 feet high. These boards are coated with moist clay into which are inserted flower petals in a mosaic fashion, making pictures of Biblical texts and other conventional designs. Mosses, berries and seeds are also used in the designs. Early on Ascension Day, the boards which have been decorated by the villagers are erected over the wells which remain dressed for a week. Thousands of people flock to see the wells and Tissington is generally recognised as the first village to have this tradition. which dates from pagan times.

Baptists have been worshipping in Duffield from 1810 although the present chapel dates from 1830, and built in the late Georgian style. Under the 1962 Town and Country Planning A it is listed as of special architectual or historical interest.

Inside seating is only for 180 people including those seats in the gallery. Around 190 a two-manual Nicholson and Lord pipe organ was installed. Adjacent to the raised pulpit is baptistry, let into the floor. Before the baptistry had been constructed, such services wer held on the bank of the River Derwent nearby. The 'dipping' spot can still be clearly seen adjacent to the Makeney Road bridge.

In 1932, the main A6 road, on which the chapel is situated, was widened, and about 7' taken off the burial ground. It was not until 1958 that most of the scattered grave-stones were repositioned along the church wall and the whole area levelled. The burial registers, is believed, are lost, so that the 30 memorials now are the only records of death available.
